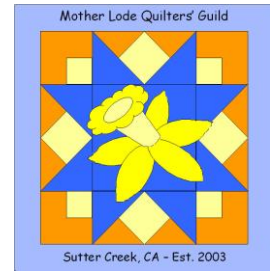

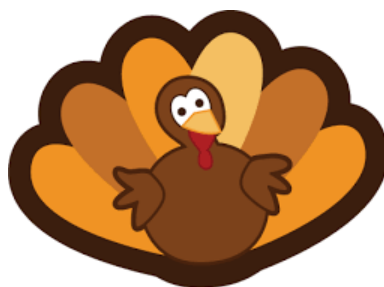

**General Meeting**  
**October 24th, 2022**

Officers present were; Vice President Sherry Phinney, President Trudy Bauman (via Zoom) Treasurer Carlene Drake and Secretary Terrie Van Scyoc.

Meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm.

There were 22 members present with 3 guests including 2 visiting guild members.

Sherry started the meeting with the introduction of Karen, the winner of our 2022 Opportunity Quilt.

We presented her with the quilt and pictures were taken. She is a local Sutter Creek resident.

September minutes were approved as printed in the newsletter. A motion to approve was brought by Ladonna Freeman and seconded by Becky Podesta.

The Auburn Quilter's Guild brought their Opportunity Quilt and sold tickets.

Treasurer report - Carlene reported a balance of \$16,358.65 at the beginning of the meeting.

President - Trudy reminded the guild that October is the month to volunteer to run for any office that may be vacant. Elections will be held at the November meeting, with installation of officers in January.

The position of Vice President is available. Sherry gave a brief description of the VP responsibilities.

They can also be seen in detail in the Guild's Bylaws. All of the other board members are going to continue for one more year.

Trudy reviewed the Quilt Show and all of its successes. She also stated that the Show committee heads had taken on a lot more responsibilities late in the planning that created much stress. We do not want these folks burned out and not serving the guild anymore. She stressed that commitment to a job is taken seriously, and follow through is a must. When the show committee met after the show there was much concern as to whether we would go forward on another show if jobs were not volunteered for by the end of next year.

Quilt Show - Becky presented the tentative financial report from the Quilt Show. We discussed how this money needs to support the guild and its activities for the following two years. Ideas were brought up as how to supplement this with more income. Many ideas and suggestions came up.

Country Store - Heather gave an overall report on the Country Store performance and sales from the Quilt Show. She also gave a report on how we can use the leftover items to continue income from their sales. Places like Made in Amador, Amador Farmers Market and local Craft Bazaars are a few. Lorrie Albin presented Carlene with money she had made from the sales of leftover magazines and books and miscellaneous items at a few garage sales she held. \$111.00 in income was collected.

Anelie mentioned the guild hosting a one-day Quilter's Yard sale for income. She has had good luck with them in the past.

Speaker- Carlene Drake gave an informative presentation on Temperature Quilts that the whole guild enjoyed. Now we know what a Temperature quilt is.

Block of the Month- Anelie showed the construction steps for the next row to make, row #9. We are skipping row #8 at this time as it has many pieces and will take longer to complete. Many members are behind as the quilt show kept them busy and the last rows were time consuming.

Opportunity Quilt - Trudy asked what we wanted to do about the next Opportunity Quilt for the guild. She presented two quilt tops to the guild for consideration. One is a Fig Tree design that Trudy made. The second is a large Lonestar design. It is a hand pieced vintage top that was anonymously donated sometime in the last 3 years. Anelie made a motion to approve the use of the vintage top, if the cleaning and light stain removal goes well. Mary Beth seconded the motion. If not, the Fig Tree design will be used. This allows us to have a fund raiser ready to go by the beginning of January. Our Opportunity quilt income on the last quilt was about \$3500.00. If we construct a new design, it usually takes 5-6 months to complete, and is a later start for fundraising.

Comfort Quilts - Donna and Dawn announced that they had set up 3 tables in the back with scrap fabric leftovers from the show. All of it was FREE to the members.

## October minutes continued

Cradle Quilts- Rita announced that the gentleman from Pioneer has finished his wooden cradles to donate to the Angel Tree project. We are now collecting small quilts for this donation. The quilts are usually made in a fat quarter size of about 22"x18".

Newsletter articles are due on November 10th to Suzy.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:29 pm.
